n the Center School, taught rades 1 through 3 at the Frost chool. Harriet Miller taught rates 4 through 6. Miss Tuttle lso taught here.

As was the custom in most rimary schools at this time, he pupils at the Frost School /ere taught to memorize oetry, particularly poems by fenry W Longfellow Mrs. who had published a book of

cems entitled "Happiness to hare" and one of the Frost eachers had her pupils nemorize some of these poems s well as those of Longfellow one day Mrs. Taylor was much

mused to hear a young boy get

up to recite. He introduced the poem as "Hiawatha" by Elizabeth Cushing Taylor, and continued right on with his recitation!

Miss Tuttle tells of the children bringing apples to the teachers, and how the pupils would jump over the wall at recess, get an apple and pound it on the stone wall and suck the juice.
