Paid for building brick safe 425.58


Furnace 240.00

665.58 Cash on committee's hands



Early pictures of the Town Hall look a little more Victorian in style from what we see today. This is due to to the fact that the main part of the steeple blew down during the 1938 hurricans and the repairs were a little simpler in design. The white coat of paint adds a new look also. From photos the building appears to have been dark when it was first built.

The Hall has, of course, been remodeled over the years. Originally there were 2 narrow stairwells on each side wall. Downstairs there was a kitchen and a hall which the Grange, Women's Club, etc., used for dinners. At one time, too, plays were performed on the little

stage while upstairs the Farm Bureau Extension Service featured movies in the evening. Prior to 1908 graduation exercises were held in the Unitarian Church, but that year and many more they were held in the Town Hall. May E. Day and Helen Burnham were the two Academy graduates of 1908 of the 4 year course -- the 3 year course was abolished in 1904-and the first class to hold exercises at the Hall. Of course there was a pump and a watering trough for the horsesthis was located on the left as one faces the building.
