
The historic village green remains a beauty spot in the town. It was bought by the town in 1748 for the purpose of a training field. A sum of 20 pounds was paid Joseph Underwood for its purchase. It was from here that the Westford Revolutionaries departed for the Old North Bridge on April 19, 1775. In 1840 public-spirited citizens raised \$102.25 to fence the green with stone posts and rails, without expense to the town. This was removed in 1895. For many years until the late 1930's, a bandstand graced the common: many concerts were given in season. Two Bicentennial additions initiated by local historian, Allister F. MacDougall, were the new flag pole and the stone benches surrounding it, a gift from the Barretto Granite Corp. One bench is marked 1776; the other 1976.

Location: 6&7G - Westford Center COL. JOHN ROBINSON MARKER

This bronze plaque commemorates Westford's national war hero of the Old North Bridge in 1775. Westford citizens returned from the Centennial in 1875 fired with enthusiasm to erect a monument to him. Another 100 years were to pass. In preparation for the Bicentennial, the Westford Minutemen dedicated this memorial to Col. Robinson in 1968. One hundred and thirty-one men marched from this muster field to concord Bridge on April 19, 1775. Their steps were retraced during the Bicentennial years by Westford Minutemen. CANNON Scouts and townspeople; the route has been established as the Col. John Robinson Trail.

Location: 687G - Westford Town Common FLAGPOLE

This sixty-foot fiberglass pole was erected with great celebration on July 3, 1975. The former pole, victim of age and vandalism, was an eighty-foot pine which grew on the farm of Abijah Fletcher near Cold Spring. It was pulled up Depot Street by a team of oxen. Dedicated on May 18, 1861, it served the town for 114 years. With spikes clear to the cradle, it made a good lookout tower for the adventurous boys in the town.

Location: 687G - Westford Town Common

A trophy of the Spanish American War, this cannon came from Morro Castle which guarded the entrance to Sanitago Harbor, Cuba. El Morro Castle was ceded by the British to Spain in 1802. Cast in 1809 by the Carron Co. of England, it was probably a token of goodwill from the British government to Spain. It weighs 4800 pounds and was loaned for ornamental purposes as an object lesson to the rising generations of the valor of the American soldiers and sailors. To accompany the cannon, the Navy donated 100-11" shells (cannon balls) of Civil War vintage. At first, piled loosely

in pyramids, today they are wisely

welded together. It was great fun to roll the balls down the hill as a Halloween or Fourth of July prank. Note that the balls do not fit the mouth of this cannon.

STONE WATERING TROUGH

In 1883 this watering trough, handhewned from a solid block of grantite. was located beside the Town Hall, here the townspeople stopped to water their horses, quench their thirst and fill milk cans with the good clear water so scarce in the Center before town water was

The Sand

This eight-sided granite monument stands about ten feet tall and is crowned with a bronze eagle. The first of eight

panels is inscribed as follows: "The Town of Westford Dedicates this Memorial to the Men and Women Who Served the Country from the Pioneers Down. Through the World War. Love and Freedom Linked the Generations. The monument is at the east end of the common and was placed in November of 1924. Total cost was \$5,860.93.

Location: 687G - Westford Town Common CAST IRON TROUGH

Donated by the Westford Grange in 1913, horses refreshed themselves in the upper trough where the flowers are found today: dogs drank from the over flow in the lower trough. A special bubbler was attached for thirsty travelers as they passed through town. With the end of the era of driving horses in the coming of the auto, the trough became ornamental.

Location: 687G - Westford Town TIVIL WAR MONUMENT

the west end of the common. located on the small triangular plot is the Soldiers' Monument presented to the town by Col. Edwin D. Metcalf, a Westford Academy graduate. His father, William Metcalf, was the first man to enlist from Westford when President Lincoln called for volunteers at the outbreak of the Civil War. When Edwin returned to Westford at the time of his father's death, he was met at the railroad station by a group of Civil War veterans who escorted him to the church and grave. In gratitude, the monument was dedicated on Memorial Day, 1910. Standing to honor William Metcalf were 23 of the 173 enlisted men from Westford. Following the dedication, dinner was served under a tent on the common with 50 in attendance.


